Subject	A Level History Unit 2 – France in Revolution
Context	These activities are designed to introduce you to the subject matter of France in Revolution. This will ensure that you begin the course in September with an understanding of the 'Big Picture' of this revolutionary period, laying the foundations for our course by exploring what France was like before the Revolution and enabling you to visualise its impact through an exploration of the way in which it shaped art and culture.
	Guidance on each of the activities is provided within the 'Bridging Materials Activities Pack'
Securing	Section 1: The Big Picture of France in Revolution By completing the activities in this section, you will not only gain an overview of how events developed over time, you will also get a sense of the changing nature of the revolutionary period, which will enable you to lay secure foundations for your A Level.
	Read through the information in the central column which tells the story of the development of the French revolution. Give each period a 'headline' – this should be a few words which you feel summarises that particular period – and summarise each period in a maximum of 3 bullet points.
Processing	Section 2: France before the Revolution  Use the information scan, and your own research if you are investigating the topics listed under 'more challenging', to produce a one-two page summary of the <i>Ancien Regime</i> . It is up to you how you present your findings; aim to include images and charts as these will be useful in helping you to understand and remember the key information.
