- attending general school events such as open days and social activities



PE Teacher

What is a PE teacher?

A physical education teacher (PE Teacher) is responsible for education in primary and secondary schools and also colleges, they teach sport and fitness to young people. They also help coach certain sports teams to the best of their ability whilst organising sports fixtures.

Once I have taught PE in secondary schools for 5 years or more I will look for Job opportunities higher up in schools such as Head of PE or Deputy Head. I feel with the skills I have gained from being a PE teacher such as; being able to speak to children and adults, great patience and having hard-working ethic I would be able to handle these roles. To become one of these higher roles I will need to learn how to perform the role well by shadowing current headteachers and deputy's headteachers. This will help me gain experience and knowledge of the work needed to perform these jobs. As I will not be

Skills needed:

- good verbals and listening skills The needs of students are vital, by having good communication and listening skills you are able to identify whats wrong and help correct these issues. this can help make school a happier place.
- The ability to plan and organise events and lessons - by planning and organising lessons it enables students to get the maximum time out of lesson. This can increase the productivity in classes, helping students learn more.
- The ability to work as a team member It is vital that you can be a team player as it can increase your quality of work due to many different contributions being suggested. By also working as a team you are able to create a positive working environment, this can help promote productivity in the school enabling a higher quality of learning.

Short term prospect PE teacher:

- To become a PE teacher I will first need to get GCSEs in English and maths with a grade 4-9. I will also need to get a grade 4-9 in any of the 3 sciences if I would like to teach in secondary schools. To help me become a PE teacher I will also take PE and get a grade in it at GCSE, this will allow me to have knowledge of the subject. This is vital because without these grades I will not be able to take the A levels I needed to teach PE.
- Once having got my GCSEs I will take A levels at a sixth form. To teach PE I will need At least 2 A levels to get to the uni of my choice (this included BTECs). I would also like to take another A level so I have something that can make me stand out from other people applying for the same course in the future. I Will take BTEC sport, Maths, and Psychology A

- Once I have fully completed my degree and got my results, I will need to take 3 skill tests to get the requirements I need to do a teacher training course. The skills tests I need to do are the following: numeracy and literacy profession skills test, An enhanced disclosure and barring service (DBS) certificate and a test to confirm I have the health and physical capacity to start training. Once I have passed all the skill tests I will then do postgraduate teacher training (ITT) course. This programme will lead me to qualified teacher status (QTS).
- After I have achieved my QTS I will help out as a teaching assistant at a wide range of schools. This will allow me to gain experience and also help me understand how to handle children and colleagues in different environments.
- Once I feel confident and feel I am ready to become a full-time teacher I will apply to a secondary school for the job of a PE teacher.

Professional Development Requirements

To get into the degree course I need to become a Pe teacher I will need a grade 4-9 in maths, English and all 3 of the sciences (biology, physics and chemistry). I will also need at least 2 A-levels in any subjects with a pass

grade. The degree I will take is a physical education teaching degree at Leeds Trinity University.

After becoming a PE teacher for a number of years at multiply schools, it can become tedious. This Is when an opportunity for promotion is helpful. This is because it allows you to change your job and what you do everyday without learning new processes or information. One promotion opportunity available as a PE teacher is promotion to head of departments (such as PE). This can be done by applying for the position when there is a space available. Once applying for the position you will have to undergo a interview explaining why you believe you are suited to the job. The previous experience you have been apart of at the school can help strengthen your argument. When getting the job there is opportunity to shadow the previous head of department, this allows you to get a feel of what the duty is like as well as making sure you are capable of handling the role. Once you have taken the role of a head of department for multiple years, there are opportunities for further promotion, for example, deputy head or head teacher of a school. This promotion also requires another several interviews by students and other teachers. However becoming a deputy head teacher or head teacher of a school is much different to being a head of department or PE teacher as there is more complex elements to it, for example, a head teacher has to speak to larger groups of people such as in assembly's as well as preparing presentations for meeting. Transitioning from a head of department to a head teacher will need practice in major areas such as speaking to larger groups of people.

There is also opportunity for specialism in a PE teacher role, for example within a private school there is the opportunity to specialise in a certain sport. To do this coaching badges are necessary as well as past experiences. To get these coaching badges you need to apply online for the a

 as well as PE lessons, without planning these sessions not only does it affect the standard of training but also the
 student's interest levels.
