

The 7 Principles of

TEACHING & LEARNING





Warmly welcome students to your lesson as they arrive.

Ensure students are clear on the independent task, that is done in silence to instigate thinking right from the start.





(-\delta')

Teacher Instruction

Share lesson goals.

Present knowledge in small steps to minimise cognitive overload.

Connect new knowledge to prior knowledge and link to the big picture.

Explicitly teach Tiers 2 and 3 vocabulary.

Review & Retrieval

Set a starter task all students attempt in order to activate prior learning and strengthen long term memory.

Respond to knowledge gaps and misconceptions that result from student feedback.



LEARNING CLIMATE

Build positive, respectful relationships with all students.

Understand our students, their barriers to learning and how their needs can be best met.

Have high expectations, be ambitious and strive for excellence for all students.

Ensure all students feel safe and don't fear failure – mistakes are part of learning.

Recognise and reward, in a meaningful way, behaviour which refects our values.

> Assertively address behaviour which does not meet our high expectations.



Model & Scaffold

Think aloud, using worked examples and models to help scaffold tasks and to share success criteria on what good looks like.

Ensure all students can experience success and work towards excellence.



Conduct whole class questioning to check for understanding, encourage independent thought, add challenge and prompt debate.

> Ensure high participation and employ Tiers 2 and 3 vocabulary.





Independent Practice

Employ easy access, high challenge activities to enable all students to demonstrate the extent of their understanding.

Conduct these in silence to allow full concentration.

Employ home learning that provides the opportunity to practise the use of key knowledge.



Conduct live marking and provide verbal feedback.

Allow time for self-assessment, reflection and improvement on actionable targets.

Verbalise key learning, including hinge concepts and vocabulary.






Committing learning to long-term memory



Typical Forgetting Curve for Newly Learned Information










Structuring independent work

Commit to a minimum of 5 hours of independent study per subject, per week





Duties	Lunch and break duty support	Helping staff members during break and lunch duty around the school.	30	
Business and Economics	Helping in lessons	Helping students in Business GCSE lessons to develop their exam technique. Circulating around the classroom in tasks and ask questions to students to help their understanding. May also be required to lead starter tasks, go through homework tasks and other exercises. They may be asked to create a quiz. *Must have done GCSE Business in order to have this as their service.	10	
Business and Economics	Lunch time economics debate group	You would be required to set up a lunch time economics debate group where you can meet and discuss current economic issues in the news - these can be both micro and macro issues. The group would be open to year 12 and 13 students and it is a way to network with other students and develop your understanding in the subject.	8	
Business and Economics	News letter	You would be responsible for spending one free period a week looking into interesting news headlines that link to Business studies and economics and send these to the department so that they can be shared in the weekly department bulletin and the sixth super curriculum bulletin.	3 for each subject (Total 6)	
Business and Economics	Business lunch time help session	To help the year 11 students prepare for their exams, you would run a GCSE revision session that they can drop in to ask questions and go through certain topics that they are struggling with. The department can provide revision materials to help with this.	10	
LRC	Helping in the library	Supporting with the management and organisation of the library. Running a book club with younger students. Listening to readers. Promoting books.	2	
Languages	Lesson support	Students are required to help in language lessons. They can work 1 to 1 with a student or they can help to answer questions or work in groups on particular activities.	6	
English	Lesson Support	Supporting and encouraging students to read and write with accuracy, fluency and confidence.	10	
English	Paired Reading	Working 1:1 with a student to provide reading support. This will develop your verbal communication skills and mentoring others.	50


